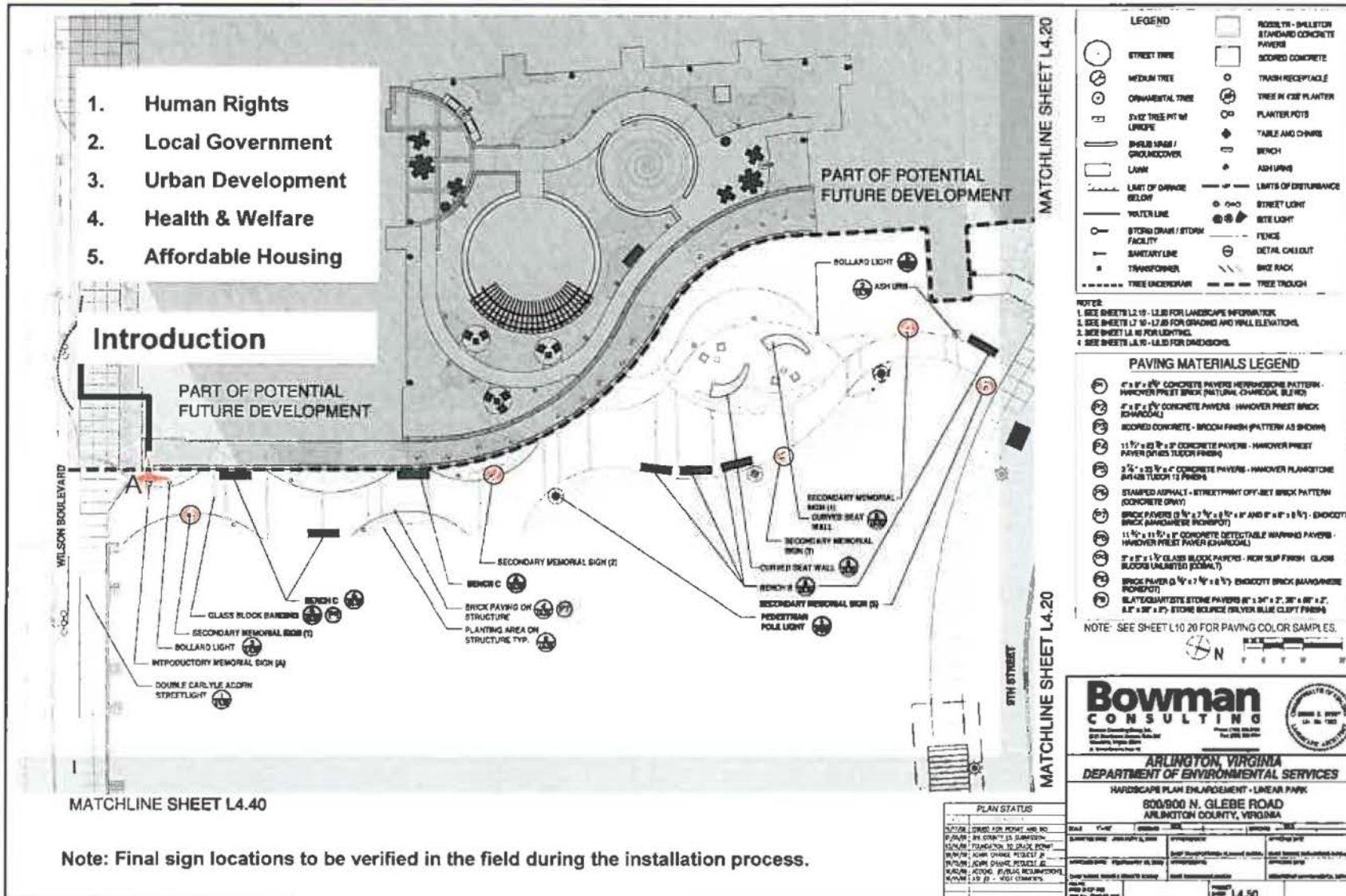

1 Human Rights



Visionary

Ellen Bozman fought hard for the rights of others. In the 1950s, she worked to eliminate school segregation in Virginia and provided support to the families of the first black children to enter a desegregated school in Arlington.

4 Health & Welfare



Visionary

Ellen Bozman worked tirelessly to protect and care for the most vulnerable in the community. In the 1960s, she pioneered Arlington's extended day program for children of working parents. She also championed day care for the frail elderly and Arlington's first nursing homes.

2 Local Government



Visionary

Ellen Bozman was deeply committed to public service. An inspiration to many, she held numerous leadership roles, including 24 years on the Arlington County Board (1974-1997). She believed government should be progressive, open, inclusive, and improve the lives of others.

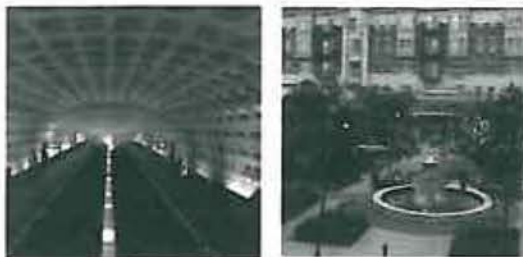
5 Affordable Housing



Visionary

Ellen Bozman believed that living in Arlington should be available to all. She was a strong advocate for affordable housing and worked hard to preserve and produce housing opportunities for low- and moderate-income residents.

3 Urban Development



Visionary

Ellen Bozman was dedicated to helping Arlington grow into an exemplary urban living environment. In the 1970s, she helped create Arlington's long-range urban development plan, including maximizing the metro corridors and ensuring the community's high quality of life.

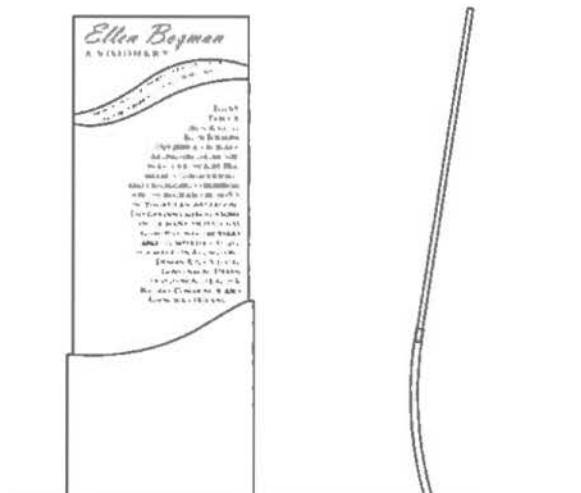

This garden celebrates some of the many issues she has addressed over the years and the ways she has left her mark on Arlington -- Human Rights, Local Government, Urban Development, Health & Welfare, and Affordable Housing.



An introduction sign will be placed along the Wilson Blvd. entrance of the memorial walk.

Its design is similar to the other 5 signs but its height provides a hierarchy that welcomes visitors.

The five small internal signs will be spread along the length of the memorial walk.

Each small sign represents Ellen's contribution to Arlington County which will be organized in five different categories -- Human Rights, Local Government, Urban Development, Health & Welfare, and Affordable Housing. .
